SITUATION REPORT.

The speed of slow merchant ships in the Atlantic is a very important factor in losses from U-boat packs, whereas in other theatres the difference between 8 and 10 knots is not critical. Examination of British shipping is being made, with a view to the possibility of increasing the speed of S.C. convoys, and the Admiralty are asking the U.S. to allocate their new ships to north Atlantic runs, the slow ships of the United Nations being used elsewhere.

Home Commands.

130 out of 147 aircraft despatched including 92 heavies, bombed Lorient last night, very fierce fires were caused, including a large one, believed to be an oil fire, in the dock area.

A searchlight Wellington today in 46.16 N., 2.27 W. attacked an Italian type U-boat with 4 depth charges and estimated one hit. Oil patch resulted, and 10 minutes later the periscope and conning tower resurfaced.

The 9th M.S.F. destroyed 41 mines in the Dover area today and sighted more apparently moored mines to the N.W. of their first lap.

"Torch" Area.

Arrangements have been started for re-arming French local convoy escorts actively employed between Casablanca and Tunis, and 2 Oerlikons each have been issued to the French ships CHASSEUR III, ENGAGEANTE and GOELAND. It is intended to make minor issues of depth charges, smoke floats and ammunition to the French as the occasion arises.

A B.2 report dated yesterday states that TIRPITZ in Lo Fiord is the only large Enemy Ship in the Trondheim area.

UREDD reports having attacked the southbound German S/M Depot Ship SAAR off Aalesund at 1356 today and estimates that she probably scored one hit.

Convoy J.W.52. Convoy J.W.52 sailed from Loch Ewe at 1738 today for North Russia. It consisted of 12 dry cargo ships and 2 black oil Tankers escorted by BLANKNEY, LEDBURY, MIDDLETON, BRITOMART, Corvettes LOTUS and STARWORT, and A/S Trawlers ST. ELSTAN and NORTHERN PRIDE. Fleet destroyers will relieve the Hunts about 1700A/20 in 66.48 N. 10.11 W. Force R and V.A.2 in ANSON with SHEFFIELD and destroyers will cover the convoy. Submarines will be on patrol off the exits from Altenfiord. The arrangements are detailed in C. in C. H.F. 0200A/10, 0916A/14 and 1126A/18.

The Panamanian Tanker VESTFOLD, 14,547 tons, was torpedoed in Convoy H.X.222 at 1444Z today in 61° 25' N. 26° 12' W. and broke in half and 19 of her crew are reported missing. The U-boat was counter attacked but without known result.

The Belgian SS OSTENDE, 4438 tons, is reported to have struck a mine off Iona at 0051 today. She was beached in Loch Na Lathaich, but became a total loss. H.M.D. LYDIA LONG, which was alongside OSTENDE after she was beached was damaged. The Fleet Sweepers QUALICUM and SHIPPIGAN from Londonderry and 4 Oropesa Trawlers from Ardrossan are sailing tomorrow morning to search the area. Later, as the result of the above circumstances and of explosions on the morning of 21st Jan, N.O.I.C. Oban reported that sabotage should be suspected, but on 22 Jan. 3 mines were cut in the area.

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SITUATION REPORT.

"Torch" area.

N.C.X.F. considers that the proposal to substitute French for British personnel in the Administration and defence of ports in North Africa raises difficult questions of policy and training which require careful investigation. He points out that owing to the low standard of French work and to short hours we are unlikely to be able to make any effective transference to them at least until major operations in Tunisia are completed.

North Atlantic.

AJAX arrived at Gibraltar this afternoon for repairs.

Mediterranean.

General Eisenhower sends today his recommendations for the re-armament of the French fleet. The most essential items from our point of view are (a) To get convoy escort ships properly equipped with close range A.A. and asdic as soon as possible.

(b) To make an immediate start on moving some of the larger units to U.S.A. for Navy Yard overhaul. This will have considerable effect on French - Allies relations.

(c) Give active employment to the Units which cannot immediately be taken in hand.

SS POLO, loaded with cased petrol was blown up at No.7 berth in Bougie harbour at 1817 from a cause at present unknown, and became a total loss. Ships in port had to be moved to the outer harbour.

L.S.T.(1) TASAJERA was torpedoed by aircraft at dusk today, 75 miles east of Algiers, but returned to Algiers under her own power. She carried 191 U.S. troops, 30 tanks and 10 other vehicles. Casualties and damage were very small.

Mediterranean - contd.

P.51 at 1006 today torpedoed and sank a northbound merchant ship escorted by a destroyer in 33.55 N. 11.2 E. (off Djerba.)

At 1727 today P.44 obtained one hit on a 7000 ton merchant ship in 38.4 N. 11.49 E. (15 miles N.W. of Marittimo, and was kept down for 36 hours in consequence.

TURBULENT reports having sunk at 1754 on 29th December in 39.17 N. 9.41 E. a northbound laden 4,5000 ton M/V escorted by an OSTIA class minelayer.

Air Operations.

Minelaying by enemy aircraft is suspected in the Bone area last night. SS RECORDER, British, was slightly damaged by a bomb at Bone this afternoon. A quay was also damaged.

Six Ju.88s attacked Tobruk last night but no damage was caused. Three or four of the enemy were destroyed.

Wellingtons bombed Tripoli and Beauforts laid mines at the entrance to La Goulette harbour last night. Bizerta was also attacked and many fires were caused. Ten Wellingtons attacked Tripoli from 1800 to 1900 today, but no naval damage is reported.

A Hudson on A/S sweep last night attacked a fully surfaced U-boat (no position given) with The U-boat returned bombs and cannon fire. the fire without damaging the aircraft, before submerging. No result other than an oil streak 8 miles long was seen. At 1915 Beauforts made a torpedo attack on a convoy of 3 merchant ships escorted by 3 destroyers in 227° Marittimo 26 miles, but results were not seen. Wellingtons attacked with torpedoes a large merchant ship in 340° Cape Bon 20 miles, and on a 6000 ton merchantman in 50° Ustica 50 miles, but no results were seen in either case.

1. I recommend the following action and priorities
for rearmament of the French Fleet after consultation with Admirals Cunningham and Glassfurd, and

subsequent inspection of French naval ships at Casablanca by Glassfurd. 2. The most essential items for our view point are:
(A) To get convoy escort ships properly equipped with close range A.A. and Asdic as soon as possible. (B) To make an immediate start on moving some of the larger units to U.S.A. for navy yard overhaul. This will have a considerable effect on French-Allies relations and assist co-operation generally.
(C) Give active employment to the units which cannot be immediately taken in hand.

Priority 1-A. Fit modern Asd&c and A.A. in 7 ocean convoy escorts COMMANDANT BORY, LA GRACIEUSE, LA BOUDEUSE, LA GRANIER, ANNAMITE, GAZELLE, and COMMANDANT DELAGE. Recommend this be done in Dakar with equipment and technical assistance from

U.S.A. or U.K. Ships to be fully employed while waiting fitting. In addition the DUMONT DURVILLE and LA GRANDIERE would make good fast escorts and DUMONT DURVILLE should be sent to U.S.A. for inspection and determination of practicability of re-engine work as previously recommended. All these ships are capable of crossing the Atlantic if necessary.

Priority 1-B. Provide 21 sets Asdic to be installed at Dakar or Casablanca in trawlers and inshore patrol vessels not capable of crossing the Atlantic. Most of these ships can reach U.K. if necessary. British have commenced supplying Oerlikons to some of these ships in the Mediterranean area.

4. Second priority. Dispatch RICHELIEU. Destroyers FANTASQUE and TERRIBLE and Cruiser (to be designated later) with additional Allied escort to U.S.A. for overhaul as soon as possible. Remainder of Cruisers to be employed immediately on anti-raider work until U.S.A. yards can take them. All these ships want considerable stripping rearming and rewiring before they can go to an active theatre. The present close in anti-aircraft batter-

ies to be removed at Dakar before proceeding to U.S.A. and to be reinstalled in trawlers and escorts.

5. Third priority: Submarines 14 available. Almost all will require extensive overhaul to fit for service in active theatre, including such items as relining torpedo tubes to take U.S.A. torpedoes, new batteries, soundproofing and Asdic. Propose ARCHIMEDE and AMAZONE to be sent immediately to U.S.A. for overhaul, others to follow. Employment of remainder meanwhile on training and such Atlantic patrols as F.O.C.W.A.F. may propose. If French wish, Adm. Cunningham is prepared to employ a proportion from Algiers.

Destroyers TEMPETE, SIMOUN, ALCYON and LE 6. Fourth priority: MALLIN are damaged and require varying amounts of damage repairs at Casablanca, most serious of which willrequire about 2 months to complete. If Asdic can be furnished immediately for SIMOUN and TEMPETE, recommend it be installed locally while other repairs are in progress. ALCYON has sound gear. If sound gear can not be furnished immediately for TEMPETE and SIMOUN then these ships plus ALCYON should overhaul in U.S.A. following completion of ships in above Second Priority. As ships do not have cruising radius to reach West Indies should be accompanied by 1 of Dakar's Cruisers to fuel at sea. LE MALIN has no sound gear and requires extensive machinery repairs incident to action, damage and also alterations as previously recommended for FANTASQUE. She should proceed to U.S.A. for overhaul as soon as temporary repairs are completed. All these ships will also require additional A.A. 7. These are various vessels such as A.M. Cruiser QUERCY, S/M Depot ship, JULES VERNE and A/S Vessel ADMIRAL MOUCHEZ which can usefully be employed in their present condition with alterations to armament which can be done on the spot as proposed by Admiral Glassfurd.

French estimate final inspection can be made in approximately 2 months and that ship will be ready to operate at sea at speed of 12 knots in approx. 4 months. Work has been started to remove main battery guns for shipment to U.S.A.

It is essential that supplies already requested for rehabilitation of French naval bases at Dakar, Oran, Algiers and Casablanca be furnished as soon as practicable as they are essential to operations of above ships that are to be fitted out at these bases.

10. The above has been discussed with and is concurred by Admiral Fennard, head of French Naval Mission to U.S.A., all authority necessary to act on questions of alterations to French ships and scheduling movements thereof.

11. While the above are recommendations with a view of getting French ships into action as soon as possible it is appreciated that the requirements must be considered in relation to the employment of shippards for U.S.A. and British construction and repair priority for which is a matter for U.S.A. and British authorities to decide.

between 0500/18 and 0530/18. There is no
evidence that minelaying occurred, but minelaying

The Admiralty realise that escorts are weak, but provision of air cover should make up for this.

C. in C. S.A. replied (19 Jan) that the A/S trawlers are arriving in need of boiler cleaning and urgent repairs. He intends to recommence group sailing from Capetown with C.A. convoys southbound east of Agulhas and C. N. convoys north and westbound, 2 sailings weekly in each direction: coastal traffic eastbound will be sailed with C.A. convoys and dispersed as necessary under air cover. On 23 Jan. C. in C. S.A. further reported that of the 18 trawlers which had reached the station only 5 will be operative until the end of January; he does not anticipate that group sailings will be started between Capetown and Durban before the end of February. This is the first intimation received by the Admiralty of the very high degree of unserviceability amongst the trawlers, and T.L. are very disturbed and on 25 Jan. they called for a report.

C. in C. S.A. replied (27 Jan) that the high degree of unserviceability of the trawlers appear to be due to prolonged steaming. Twice weekly escorted convoys north and south from Capetown and east from Durban have already commenced, as have group sailings between Agulhas and Durban and between Durban and Lourenco Marques. Both these latter are unescorted except for the air and fully escorted sailings will probably not be possible for 3 or 4 weeks. He still considers the chief problem is lack of surface escorts for faster ships.

In the early hours of this morning M.T.Bs operating between Scheveningen and the Hook of Holland sighted and engaged an enemy force consisting of two 600 ton Trawlers and a small merchant vessel. M.T.B.224 torpedoed the latter, which blew up, and M.T.B.70 secured one torpedo hit on one of the trawlers. Whilst disengaging, our M.T.Bs came under fire from another enemy force, and also from the coastal batteries, but no damage was caused and there was only one slight casualty.

Another force of M.T.Bs sailed from Lowestoft at 1553/18 to intercept a convoy of 15 ships with 2 M/S as escort, which had been reported off Ymuiden two hours earlier. Aircraft attacked the convoy at 1917 in 53.15 N. 4.37 E. and hit 3 ships, but the M.T.Bs did not find the enemy. At 0450 today, however, in 53.41 N. 5.8 E. the M.T.Bs sighted and attacked 4 small vessels, but did not see the result. The M.T.Bs suffered no damage or casualties.

SS QUEEN ELIZABETH left the Clyde for New York this morning, with personnel for U.S.A.

29 aircraft of Bomber Command laid mines last night in the Frisian Is. - Elbe area.

At 1415 today P.228 attacked a 2000 ton laden merchant vessel escorted by an A/S schooner and an armed trawler in 39.41 N. 9.43 E. (off the east coast of Sardinia). The merchant ship was sunk by torpedo and the schooner by gunfire, and the trawler was beached in a sinking conditon.

Extract from War Diary of C. in C., Levant, January, 1943. T.S.D. 4677/43.

January 18, 19 43.

Operation Welcome. HMS THUN DERBOLT arrived off Tripoli (L), passage from Malta being without incident. At 2030 the executive signal to carry out the operation was made by Captain (S), Tenth Submarine Flotilla. At 2308 in position 315 degrees Tripoli Light 8 miles THUN DERBOLT launched her chariots. During these operations an E-boat was sighted a mile away but fortunately for THUN DERBOLT she was keeping a poor lookout. THUN DERBOLT was pre arrously placed, since the containers were open, and chariot personnel were on deck being dressed. By remaining stern on to the E-boat she was undet ected; having evaded the E-boat, THUN DERBOLT launched her chariots and withdrew to Malta.

2. Arrangements were made for Fleet Air Arm Albacores to drop flares and Red Verpy's lights to assist THUNDERSOLT on her run in and the chariots a tering Tripoli (L) harbour. These were most effective. Diversionary hombing was also carried out.

January 19, 1943.

One chariot, soon after launching, developed defects and landed at about 0330 just west of Tripoli. The chariot was destroyed and the crew made their way inland through the outskirts of Tripoli. After the occupation of Tripoli (L), an inspection of the wrecked GUILIO showed three possible limpet holes on her starboard side; this was the chariot's secondary target. His primary target was the SAN GIOVANNI BATTISTA, which was by then already in place as a block ship. Through an error, a final signal by Commander-in-Chief, Mediterranean, altering the priority of targets was never received by THUNDERBOLT. As a consequence a potential blockship was not attacked. There is no evidence to show what occurred to his main charge. The crew of the chariot, one officer and one rating, are missing.

2. It is not clear to Admiralty, however, whether or not it is Admiral Collinet's intention to promulgate by W/T to French warships operating under his orders most secret information of this nature obtained from British sources. Presumably he will wish to do so at times, and this raises important question of security of Code or Cypher he would then use.

3. You should point out frankly to Collinet that we are greatly hampered in passing this kind of information to him owing to the security risks involved in its subsequent use. You should employ this argument to reinforce strongly the arguments in A.M.1042A/20 that we cannot work properly together without Liaison Officers being attached to French warships. If, after pressing him on these lines, you fail to persuade him to accept L.O.s we agree to the information being passed subject to the following conditions being rigidly observed in the subsequent dissemination of the information.

4. (Technical).
(b) The volume of such messages should be restricted to minimum essential to operational conduct of French warships concerned. These precautions are important. Restriction at (b) could be relaxed when more aditions of Tables for use with Anglo-French Books become available.

5. If arrangements in preceding para. are not practicable and it is Admiral Collinet's intention to continue communicating with his warships in purely French Code or Cypher, then subject to remarks in next para. there are strong objections to his using such Code or Cypher for W/T messages containing secret operational information supplied to him by us. This is because (as already stated) we have reasons for believing that French Codes and Cyphers hitherto used in Africa are in general not wholly secure against the enemy.

6. Failing use by Admiral Collinet of Anglo-French Books, however, we should be agreeable to his using his own system if it could be clearly established that: (Technical details).
7. It would be very desirable if Admiral Collinet would authorise disclosure to B.N.L.O. Dakar of full repetition full details of French Code or Cypher he wishes to use failing Anglo-French Cypher or Code. B.N.L.O. then to report these details for information of Admiralty with particular reference to the points mentioned in para. 6. This would enable Admiralty to decide whether it is sufficiently secure for transmission by W/T of secret operational information received from British

8. It would obviously be preferable, from point of view of co-ordinating Naval communications in West Africa, if Admiral Collinet could be persuaded to use Anglo-French Book for W/T communication with his warships, and to discontinue use of purely French system for this purpose. There are admittedly, however, logical grounds for his wishing not to do so since Anglo-French Books are designed primarily for communication between British and French and not between French themselves.

Exact results from third Albacore's torpedo were not observed but flash followed by smoke was seen on 1 D/R.

- 1. This telegram has not yet been cleared with all concerned but we will cable before your meeting on Saturday.
- 2. We welcome C.P.R.B. enquiry into escort vessel programmo (see C.O.S.(W) 429). No part of the war production programmes is of greater importance at the present time, but we want, as the President wrote to the Prime Minister, both to have our cake and eat it. Every effort must be made to increase the output of escort vessels without reducing merchant shipbuilding. Please impress upon your American colleagues that we must both have the ships to protect them and the means to protect them.
- 3. U.K. corvette programme was last revised in November, when the Cabinet decided that 200 corvettes should be built for delivery by the end of 1944. At the same time it was laid down that repairs to merchant ships building should retain equal priority with corvette construction and that the planned production of merchant shipbuilding of 1,800,000 deadweight tons should not be reduced below 1,570,000 deadweight tons as a result of increased corvette production. As originally phased, the bulk of the deliveries of corvettes would have been in 1944 and the cost to merchant shipbuilding would have been slight in 1943. Since the Cabinet decision, steps have been taken to accelerate the planned rate of delivery in 1943. The present forecast of deliveries in 1943 is 38 single scrsw and 40 twin screw. The balance of the 200 will be produced evenly in 1944. This programme will reduce merchant shipbuilding by 76,000 deadweight tons in 1943 to about 1,724,000 tons and by 230,000 in 1944 to about 1,570,000 tons.
 - 4. Within the Admiralty programme corvettes have the highest priority. No special machinery has yet been

found/....

-2found necessary to resolve conflicts between the Admiralty programme and the programmes of other departments. Further acceleration in the delivery of corvettes limited by very definite production bottlenecks in the manufacture of engines and gear including R.D.F. and by shortage of fitting out labour. Any further expansion of the corvette programme made at the expense of merchant shipbuilding could not be effective until 1944. We have already reduced escort vessels to 2 standard types - destroyers and corvettes. Corvettes themselves fall into two types - single screw and twin screw. Some of the yards building corvettes can only turn out the single screw type. On standardisation of merchant ships we have imposed simplification of design and minimum variation of type consistent with operational needs and production facilities available. Simplification cannot be carried further. After his exhaustive tour in U.S.A. Ayre reports that sheer necessity has already imposed on us a greater degree of simplification than has been adopted in U.S.A. 7. U.S. programme of escort vessels. We note with concern (C.C.S.137/2) that the revision of the U.S. programme in December results in a reduction from 79 to 43 of the deliveries of destroyer escorts in the first half of 1943. Clearly one escort vessel delivered within the next six months is worth much more than a vessel delivered towards the end of the year. 8. We have not yet had Dorling's detailed list of requirements in which we could help U.S.A. towards their corvette programme, but in advance we are considering whether any capacity for steam and water valves or other components could be gained from the modifications in Ministry of Supply programmes at present under way. There is no capacity available for turbine gear cutting. We fully realise the importance of trying to supply from this country parts which are holding up the delivery of escort vessels in the U.S. The Admiralty and the Ministry of Production will give the closest attention to this problem. 9./

- 9. But it is essential that U.S. production of merchant ships in 1943 should be at least 18.8 million tons. The increase in escort vessels now contemplated should be at the expense if necessary of the surplus over that figure which was thought possible when the Minister of Production was in Washington.
- programme by synthetic rubber and high octane plants is most serious, and requires careful watching. Please see C.O.S.(W) 443. We shall await with interest your report on the exact degree in which these three programmes overlap. We agree with MIN15 that absolute priority for any one of the three programmes would be a mistake, and that proper scheduling of the bottleneck parts is the most effective procedure. Please send us regular report on the progress of these three vital programmes.
- 11. Canada. While we recognise the limitations of single screw corvettes please impress on Mr. Howe that any corvette in 1943 is better than none; and it may be possible to increase the output of single screw corvettes without interfering with merchant shipbuilding. Please do not take any decision involving reduction in Canadian output of merchant ships without giving us opportunity to study the consequences,

Staff. They have not yet been considered by

until I know your views.

2. We are most anxious to do all we can to meet

your requirements.

3. Admiralty's present policy is to allocate new destroyers for service with the Fleet where air attacks or offensive action with enemy surface units is probable and your offer of the four Canadian Tribals for this service is most welcome.

4. The replacement or reinforcement of ocean escorts has therefore to be made from older destroyers released from the fleet by new construction, or by American built "Destroyer Escorts" (D.E's and B.D.E's).

5. For the reinforcement of Canadian and other Escort groups therefore we can only offer the older destroyers (D. to I. class) as they are released, or the new American Destroyer Escorts. Latter are the most suitable for R.C.N. war requirements. Those which we should be prepared to recommend would be D.E's of the better type, namely vessels of 1600 tons with a speed of 24 knots and endurance of 6,000 miles at

12 knots.

6. Under present programme vessels of type specified are due for completion as follows: one each in March, May, June and July and two in August 1943, total six, with others to follow.

10. In considering your longer term requirements you will no doubt bear in mind that there are likely to be ample opportunities at the end of the war to adjust the proportion of Fleet and Escort destroyers in the R.C.N. with those in the Royal Navy and under construction.

E-boat activity.

CORNCRAKE, (K.M.S.8)

The controlled minelayer CORNCRAKE, a straggler and out of touch since dark 23rd January from Convoy K.M.S.8 was reported sinking in 55.10 N. 13.30 (120 miles west of Bloody Foreland) at 0913A today. LANDGUARD (S.O. of Escort) detached LONDONDERRY and also ordered REGINA to search for her, but REGINA was not reported sailing from Londonderry until 1709A today. At 1045Z today LANDGUARD reported that he had detached LONDONDERRY to stand by CORNCRAKE who is in danger of sinking and C. in C. W.A. diverted to her assistance a Sunderland aircraft en route to K.M.S.8. A Fortress is to assist in the search tomorrow.

C. in C. W.A. reports that the continued high percentage of failure of air escorts to meet convoys causes anxiety.

12 Bostons with fighter escort and target support attacked the docks at Flushing today.

A few bombs were dropped at Poole early this afternoon. Some slight naval damage was caused ashore.

conference at my request with Vice Admirals Pegram and Collinet and others vitally interested here to explain the North Africa Area Petroleum Officer set-up as it affects French West Africa and to be made acquainted with view of those concerned at Dakar and in the West African strategic area before proceeding to join Eisenhower. As a result of this conference it was assumed that Admiral Pegram who will use Freetown as main convoy assembly point will continue to order fuel at Freetown as before and that Dakar on the other hand within Pegram's Command will order fuel oil through its own Area Petroleum Officer. Accordingly it is requested that an Assistance Area Petroleum Officer Dakar be appointed and that he arrive Dakar with least possible delay. The question of coal supply was also discussed in view of fact that French ships for employment West Africa coastal traffic largely use this fuel thus it is equally important there be appointed to Dakar at once the equivalent for coal of the Assistant Area Petroleum Officer. Aircraft for North Russia. It is intended to send two Hampden A/C Squadrons and, subject to Russian concurrence, a R/C Force of Catalina and P.R. A/C to North Russia to act against enemy surface forces operating against J.W. and R.A. Convoys during the period April to September.

Operation "Gondola".

During the period 3rd to 13th February Coastal Command intend to conduct an air attack on the largest scale possible upon some of the 45 U-Boats now operating in the North Atlantic and believed to be likely to be then returning to their Biscay bases from 22° W.

Four Wellingtons out of 8 detailed attacked Emden today and report that bombs are believed to have burst near the submarine sheds and on the western docks; 2 aircraft are missing.

"Torch" Area.

Supplies for "Torch" Area. N.C.X.F. makes certain recommendations in connection with convoys for "Torch" Area. He points out that whilst 65% of shipments come from the U.K. and only 35% from U.S.A., the proportion of supplies originating in the two countries is roughly reversed. It would obviously be more economical in shipping, in time and handling if the proportion of direct shipment from U.S.A. approximated to the proportion of supplies originating there.

Mediterranean.

Convoy T.E.14. SAMPHIRE sunk. BICESTER escorting Convoy T.E.14 reports that the corvette SAMPHIRE was sunk by a submarine at 0018 today in 37° 07' N. 5° 32' E., about 30 miles north-east of Bougie. ZETLAND searched for the submarine and picked up survivors. BICESTER asked N.C.X.F. for fighter protection as early as possible.

A submarine shelled a coast watch outpost close to Cape Andrea (Cyprus) today.

Air operations.

There was an air attack on Algiers last night but no damage is reported and Beaufighters report 3 enemy aircraft shot down.

Last night 15 Wellingtons attacked the docks at Bizerta. The attack was concentrated into a period of 14 minutes and successful results are reported. One E-Boat was gunned and brought to a stop.

Halifaxes last night attacked the railway ferry terminus at Messina starting fires at or near the nearby fuel tanks.

about 40 ships. (b) Combined K.M.S. and S.L. convoys from U.K. to N. and W. Africa every 22 days, each convoy with a Gib., W. African and Algerian section. Latter section about 20 ships.

There is very extensive masonry damage on both sides of the dock and two points where considerable leakage is occurring. Investigations are in hand to determine best method of reducing

these leaks which aggregate about 1500 tons per hour. The dock bottom is a shambles of dock blocks, masonry and mud. KINGSTON is lying flat on her port side at an angle of 15° to line of the dock with a minimum of 18" between her side and dock floor. She was hit over the gear room by a large calibre bomb and almost broken in two. She is very extensively damaged internally and externally and is a constructive total loss. It is intended to cut the ship in two and endeavour to make fore and after parts buoyant enough to right them in dock and subsequently float them out and beach them. As many fittings etc. as possible will be recovered for further use but it is unlikely that the armament, main engines and majority of equipment will be of any further use. It is expected that the propellers and shafts can be recovered and made serivceable. Request immediate despatch by air mail of copies of hydrostatic curves, stability curves and summary of weight calculations to enable suitable flooding or ballasting of ship in her present position to be investigated with a view to floating her upright when dock is flooded. A force of 6 destroyers sailed from Plymouth in the early hours, to escort ILLUSTRIOUS: two of them SARDONYX and SCIMITOR returned to Plymouth with weather damage and the remainder proceeded to Falmouth for shelter. BLOODHOUND was driven ashore at Portland during the height of the gale.

E.boats were engaged in minelaying off Bone on the night 29/30 and 30/31. On the second occasion 4 M.T.Bs engaged them in gun action, causing them to jettison their mines. The M.T.Bs, who suffered no damage, chased the enemy 15 miles.

M.T.Bs. 260, 264, 307 and 313 sailed from Malta at 1727A/31 for an operation off Kuriat but were prevented by the weather from carrying it out. (See 1 February.)

Last night one of 3 Wellingtons sent to attack shipping in the Pantelleria area attacked with torpedoes a merchant ship escorted by a destroyer in 36.33 N. 12.47 E., steering 225° and obtained one hit on the destroyer which was left stationary and listing heavily.

Ten Wellingtons from Blida bombed the docks at Bizerta last night, many of the bombs falling alongside the docks. At 1035 Malta Beaufighters attacked a 3000 ton merchant ship escorted by a destroyer and 3 A.A. ships stationary in 140° Hammamet 2 miles and near missed and gunned the merchantman: two Beaufighters Three were shot down and 2 slightly damaged. schooners 10 miles north of Sousse were also shot up and one left stationary. Wellingtons sent to attack enemy shipping between Naples and Sicily were unable to carry out any attacks. Sixteen B.24s today bombed the ferry terminus at Messina obtaining hits and near misses on the target and hits on railway track and sidings. A merchant vessel at quay and another leaving harbour are reported hit and other bombs fell amongst a group of vessels outside the harbour. (Note A.S.O.S. 802 states that this attack occurred on 30th Jan. 26 or 27 B.17s of the 12th U.S.A.F. escorted by 31 P.38s today attacked the docks and shipping at Ferryville and caused several large fires in the Dock area. Direct hits were seen on a vessel at the most northerly Dock, and several other vessels tied up at the docks are believed to have been damaged. A 1000 lb bomb is stated to have hit between a dock and a ship, probably causing a large hole in the vessel's side.
