With the successful completion of "Torch" the passing of aircraft forward from Gib. became a straightforward administrative matter and the principal operational task of the A.O.C. became once more the protection of sea communications. With further reference to your 280137 October, it is probably not realized to what extent the difficulties in this country of manning the convoy escort vessels are enhanced by either lack or tardy arrival of information concorning your policy and intentions.

2. After the receipt of this signal and in the absonce of any reply to my 291818 October, which gave the completion dates for the remainder of the programme, I felt it necessary to inform the U.S.N. that it would no longer be possible to man all ships of the programme on the published completion dates. This has had an immediate reaction and the U.S.N. have expressed grave concern over this decision, probably due to the expectation that embarrassment would be caused to the administration by the consequent criticism based on the fact that lend lease equipment was not being placed: immediately in use, a matter which is receiving as you probably know undue prominence at the present time in the American press.

I have therefore been approached most strongly to make every possible effort to remove the ships from the continental limits of the U.S.A. and I am requesting N.S.H.Q. for permission to lay up a certain number of ships at Halifax, N.S., using ferry crews and the minimum skeleton care and maintenance parties borrowed in part from R.C.N. and in part from my own resources, but this procedure cannot be regarded as good for the material and will involve a delay in bringing the ships forward for service in addition to the great inconvenience which it will cause.

I have just received Admiralty reference sheet M.O. 11045/43 of October 1943, with the minutes of the meeting held on the 7th October, 1943, concerning pre-commissioning training in B.F.E's stationed at Belfast. It is now thought probable from paragraph eight of these minutes that the statement in the last sentence of the above quoted signal that no more advance parties would be sent refers only to the decision to abandon the policy of sending crews out in two sections as advance and main parties and that thereafter the crews will arrive in one body.

Some hours later H/F D/F bearings of a second U-Boat were obtained by the Group and, after proceeding towards it at 17 kmots, WILD GOOSE obtained an asdic contact at 13472. STARLING attacked this at 1404Z and at 1500Z ordered a torpedo-attack by WILD GOOSE. At 1506Z an under-water explosion was heard, after which wreckage, human remains, and much oil came to the surface. Both these attacks were directed by STARLING; and after each of them the half of a German torpedo came to the surface.

- (e) The above arrangement remain in force until the conclusion of the war in Europe.
- (f) The cable be run via England, but the two channels allocated for the exclusive use of the U.S... be manned and operated by U.S. personnel.

1. Our immediately preceding telegram.

2. We have considered the recent telegrams on the subject of a proposal by Cominch to withdraw

certain U.S. Naval Squadrons from the anti-U-Boat offensive in

the Bay of Biscay.

We do not press for the retention in the U.K. of the one Squadron now due to leave for Morocco. We note with regret that orders for this move have already been issued and the move would have taken place on 1st November but for bad weather. we would urge that this squadron should be employed in the Bay offensive from its new base in Morocco as soon as it is operational. We consider that the former U.S. strength of 6 Liberator squadrons between U.K. and Morocco should be maintained, if necessary at the expense of other areas which are at present unquestionably of less importance to the U/Boat war.

4. We regret the misunderstanding which led Admiral King to form the impression that U.S. participation in the Bay offensive This may have arisen from C.O.S.(W)587 was on short-term basis. of 21st April and subsequent discussions, in which it was emphasised that U.S. co-operation was required as quickly as

possible to take advantage of the enemy's being unable to listen to Centimetre A.S.V. The impression may thus have been formed that the aircraft would not be required in the winter. Air Marshal Slessor has never intended to imply an operation of short duration but only that it was very important to act

We realize that the reasons for Cominch's present proposals The strategic effect of the changes are mainly administrative. proposed will however be a serious reduction in our Combined A/S strength in the Bay and Gib/Morocco areas. Moreover it is clear from para. 1 and 5 B.A.D. 272059/October that Cominch still adheres to the views on the strategic value of the Bay offensive expressed in para. 1 of his 082213 October to Commaveu. We regard the Bay offensive as still being a key factor in the war against the U/Boats, and stress that far from regarding the facts outlined in third sub-para. of para 5 of Admiralty's 132357A as amplified by Admiralty 231317A as "nuisance value" we consider them to be of major importance. Further, the facts, as quoted in para. 1 are in error. Since 2nd August, aircraft have been responsible for five kills in the Bay and its approaches, and a further 18 Leigh Light attacks have taken place, the results of which cannot yet be assessed.

Bay Offensive (Contd.) 6. The A/S statistics for September have a significant bearing on the suggestion that the Bay is profitable and no more unsafe for U-Boats than other areas. In the Bay offensive in September 14,404 hours were flown for 24 sightings and 12 attacks resulting in one kill and one damaged and interned in Vigo. as well as 2 leigh

and 12 attacks resulting in one kill and one damaged and interned in Vigo, as well as 9 Leigh Light attacks not yet assessed. Hours flown per sighting were 600. On basis of hours flown per sighting (the latter representing an opportunity for a kill) the Bay compares very favourably with other areas and the statistics for October which are not yet complete look like following similar lines. In the Bay offensive there were 13 sightings and 10 attacks (including 5 Leigh Light unassessed) and one kill.

7. The Gibraltar/Morocco area is also extremely profitable, the figures there for September being 11 sightings and 7 attacks (of which 5 were Leigh Light and are still unassessed) for 2,831 hours flying or one sighting per 257 hours. In October there were 6 sightings in this area and 3 attacks all Leigh Light unassessed. This is excluding the hours flown from Gibraltar and Lyautey in the Bay Approaches which are included in the figures in para. 3 above.

8. In this connection it may be that some misunderstanding has been caused by the fact that our figures for the Bay offensive include some flying, sightings and attacks outside the "Bay area", as defined in July with Captain Coldins of the Navy Department. This definition was an arbitrary one made for statistical purposes. No such area can be relied upon to correspond permanently with the tactical realities of the Bay offensive which sometimes extends beyond these boundaries. Since July U-Boat tactics have changed and offensive petrols in the Bay and its approaches have had to be extended Westwards and Southwards to catch U-Boats on passage in and out. Use of the Azores may well further extend of Bay offensive. Our figures for the Bay offensive which are those submitted to the War Cabinet A.U.Committee by Coastal Command in their monthly summary therefore cover all offensive anti-submarine patrols flown by aircraft from U.K., Gibraltar, Azores, or Morocco designed to catch U-Boats in transit into and out of the Bay and include patrols wholly or in part outside the defined boundaries of the Bay area.

9. In view of the foregoing the strategic argument for maintaining the anti-submarine offensive in the Bay and Gibraltar/Morocco areas at the greatest possible strength seems to us unanswerable.

10. With reference to para. 5 of B.A.D. 272059Z we would entirely agree that U.S.Squadrons and, we would add, British squadrons if required, should be moved from the Bay on 1st January, or any other date before or after, when it is agreed in accordance with the principles in para. 3 of our O.Z. 3607 that they could be more profitably employed elsewhere.

Conduct of A/S operations in Atlantic. Following from Chiefs of Staff personal for Field Marshal Dill. 1. We have been considering the recent interchange of signals between the Admiralty and B.A.D. and the representations by Noble and Welsh to the Admty. and Air Min. on the subject of Cominch's proposal to withdraw certain Squadrons from the

Bay offensive. 2. In order to avoid further misunderstandings and to clarify the responsibility for movement of A/S forces in and out of the different strategic areas we should like to establish certain agreed principles for the joint conduct of A/S operations in the Atlantic.

3. The principles are as follows:-

(A) Any redistribution of A/S squadrons between British, Canadian and U.S. areas of responsibility in the Atlantic will be effected in consultation between the British, Canadian and American authorities concerned, reference being made to the

C.C.O.S. if necessary.
(B) The diposition of A/S units within any area of the Atlantic will be a matter for decision by the British, Canadian or American authorities according to whether the area concerned is one for which Britain, Canada or the U.S. are responsible in accordance with the conclusion of the Atlantic Convoy Conference, subject to the concurrence of the authorities to whom the squadrons belong. (C) The operational direction of all A/S squadrons in a British, Canadian or American area of responsibility in the Atlantic shall be vested in the appropriate British, Canadian or American authority.

4. We are not agreed among ourselves as to the best line of action. On the one hand we are advised that to propose to the C.C.O.S. the acceptance of the above principles would merely antagonise King, who would feel that he was being put on the spot. On the other hand it is held that unless King is made to accept these or similar principles we shall be perpetually liable to arbitrary action on his part resulting in disorganisation of

our combined arrangements for the anti U-Boat war.

5. We are content to leave it to you to decide what action is best calculated to achieve our object, which is to secure the most efficient system of control of the combined A/S effort with the minimum adverse effect on our relations with the American Chiefs of Staff.

Your 191735 Oct. Italians were already in de facto state of co-belligerency and declaration of war does not, in H.M. Govt.'s view, alter Italian relation to Allies in any way. Treatment of Italians will depend upon their works rather

than their words. Accordingly, employment of Italian warships with Italian crews has, in our opinion, still to be considered on the merits of each case. If Italians show greatly improved morale, no doubt larger employment of Italianmanned ships in battle service can be considered. 2. It is emphasised that whatever employment may now be given to Italian Fleet, great importance is attached to Allied power of disposal over Italian Fleet being adequately safeguarded by the amendments to N.A.F. 381 proposed in C.O.S.(W) 859. 3. Taking Admiral King's other remarks in detail:-LITTORIOS. We agree there are many practical disadvantages, including the shortage of facilities for their overhaul. As considerable work would be required to fit them for the purpose, we consider their use as transports impracticable. We therefore recommend that they remain laid up for the time being with a view to their possible use in the Far East at a later date. 4. CAVOURS. We are consulting C. in C. Med. as to whether he has any use for ships of this class in support of operations in the Med., taking into account that no additional ammunition can be manufactured. He would presumably make use first of the ship proposed to be stationed at Taranto. We ask the C.C.S. to approve in principle that all the ships of this class for which C. in C. Med. has no use, should be laid up with the LITTORIOS. If other requirements for any of these ships should arise, including allotment to our Allies, they can be considered on their merits. It would be easier to obtain full control of them after they had been laid up.

This was the first U-Boat sunk by aircraft operating from the Azores. C. in C. W.A. estimates that the U.S. A/C Carrier SANTEE escorted by 3 U.S. destroyers will reach the Convoy tonight.

Anti-U-Boat campaign. 3. C. in C. W.A. considers that U-Boats are now remaining submerged during daylight far longer than heretofore and that air searches, to be successful, must in future be chiefly carried out at night. He has accordingly today issued a directive to Escort Carriers in his command that they are to take every opportunity of practising night flying.

It has come to my knowledge that further reductions in the fixed defences of the Firth of fixed Forth are under consideration by the Chiefs of defences.

Staff Committee. This is the first information I have received. Whilst, under the scale of attack envisaged, there is no Naval objection to the reduction of the guns, I am anxious to retain certain of the searchlights in both Middle and Inner

Lines.

(2) With regard to the Middle Line, it is considered most desirable to be able to illuminate the waters over the Inchkeith controlled minefield. This would entail the retention and/or replacement of the following C.A.S.Ls - two concentrated moving lights each at Inchkeith North and Pettycur, one each at Inchkeith South and Leith Docks, all at two minutes notice.

(3) With regard to the Inner Line, local defence organisation includes the illumination of the Oxcars Boom during certain periods to ensure that Human Torpedoes, etc. are not obtaining entry over the Boom and it is also considered desirable to be able to illuminate the Boom in the event of attack by light surface forces. Nightflying from Escort Carriers. Bitter experience is proving to U-Boats the danger of continuous patrolling on the surface by day. It is now only at night or when moving to attack that U-Boats may surely be found on the surface. (2) Night-flying therefore assumes increased importance and all escort carriers are to seek every opportunity to increase night-flying experience in ocean conditions when weather permits ter. This should not be difficult to arrange

during this winter. when working with a support group and even when operating with a convoy if the escorts are available and convoy is not threatened the carrier can leave convoy at night for flying training.

(3) When carrier is in convoy and conditions appear favourable for these practices routine A/S patrol should be carried out as far as possible by any Mac-ship in company to enable the escort carrier to take full advantage of opportunity to further its night operational efficiency.

It is therefore proposed to sail escort carriers in convoy for the present and to aim at achieving the maximum standard in experience in night-flying by the time the weather will permit of a more profitable use of this type of operation. (3) To this end I am issuing a directive to escort carriers under my command to take every opportunity to carry out night flying practices. Similar practices to be carried out in open waters will also be introduced into their programmes.

Now that Leros is well garrisoned and organised it is hoped that it will be able to beat off or at any rate seriously weaken the first assaults; and C. in C. Levant considers that destroyers can best contribute to the battle by combing the area after dark for follow-up landing craft and/or convoys. The submarines will remain in their present disposition for a similar object. (b) FURY, EXMOOR, and BLENCATHRA left the Gulf of Doris last night and withdrew south.

(c) Continuous air attacks on Leros were reported throughout today, amounting to 70 sorties, directed especially against gun positions. Only minor damage was caused.

CUCKMERE shot down one aircraft and EMPIRE COPPERFIELD claims one. The escorting fighters may also have shot down one, and they damaged a second. The convoy was thought to have been attacked by U-Boat in 36.13 N. 00.05 W. about midnight, but this was apparently incorrect. Six ships were reported hit in the air attack. Of these, INDIAN PRINCE, CARLIER, BIRCHBANK and NIVOSE were sunk (the first named after being taken in tow); and TAKLIWA and JOSIAH PARKER, though hit, were only slightly damaged and continued with the convoy.

Attack on Leros.

7(a) An attack on Leros from about 18 landing craft from Kos/Kalimno began shortly after 0400Z today. The landings were supported by Stukas and by about 4 vessels variously reported as destroyers and naval auxiliaries, but probably one destroyer (probably ex-Italian TURBINE, cf. C. in C. M.E. 19th November 385314) and 3 torpedo boats. Landings were made from 15 landing craft in the north-east part of the island, and from 3 landing craft at P. Bianco, east of Leros town.

(b) It was later estimated that the enemy put ashore today 2000 troops by sea and 500 by air. Three landing craft were reported sunk and others damaged, by the coast defences. At 0850B it was reported that no vital ground had been lost in any area, but the enemy were clinging to the lower slopes of Appetici and Vedetta. Two landing craft are reported sunk and 2 damaged.

FAULKNOR (D.8) and two "Hunts" will patrol close round Leros and the west coast of Kalimno tonight for follow-up craft. There are 3 M.T.Bs. at Leros and one "Fleet" and two "Hunts" should

arrive in the area tonight.

With reference to A.M. 041858A and my 121230Z. As regards the visits to Ponta Delgada, full notice was given of my visit there, flying my broad pennant in VOLUNTEER on 1st when calls were exchanged with Civil Governor, Military Governor

(G.O.C. Azores) and C. in C. Maritime Defences, and stay was limited to 24 hours. It was perfectly clear that no relaxation of restrictions or co-operation could be arranged locally, everything having to be referred to Lisbon, so that little can be accomplished there, even if permission is obtained for visits to be made.

Now there are no ships to go in and aircraft are not permitted to land on the aerodrome or in the harbour.

Although the possession of an aerodrome in Terceira is exceedingly advantageous, the purely Naval facilities in the Azores do not amount to much if Ponta Delgada and the aerodrome on San Miguel are excluded. Recent proposals from the Air Min. for Fleet Air Arm to set up an organisation for dealing with crated aircraft in Terceira are in my opinion impossible owing to shipping difficulties, and it would only be possible if use could be made of the Island of San Miguel.

Weather has been particularly favourable for unloading at Angra and a gale that has now blown incessantly since this was finished shows that the majority if not all, of our landing craft might well have been lost and that the operation might not have been completed this winter.
