buoy but were brought to action by SEYMOUR and
COTSWOLD, SEYMOUR sinking one boat and taking
26 prisoners and COTSWOLD damaging another.
Another Wellington followed the 5th Group towards
Dunkirk, where RIOU and her M.T.Bs. twice drove
them off before they reached the convoy route,
scoring gun hits.

ALBRIGHTON (patrol 4) made radar contact with this group at 0122 ll miles south of Hearty Knoll as it retired east. Shore radar indicated possibly another group joining this one from eastward soon after 0100. ALBRIGHTON engaged single E-Boat at 0053 near Hearty Knoll Buoy. (4) Estimate 9 or 12 E-Boats in this area most probably looking
- for convoy.
 (5) Ostend area. 4 or 5 E-Boats at 35 knots eluded patrols and crossed Q.Z.S. 581 at N.F. 8 buoy at 2310 reaching position 4 miles N.W. of Ostend at 2320. They turned here and recrossed channel at N.F. 9 buoy being engaged by SEYMOUR (patrol 16) and COTSWOLD (patrol 14). SEYMOUR sank one. COTSWOLD damaging another. Two officers and 24 ratings taken prisoner.
- (6) North of Dunkirk. 2317 RIOU (patrol 12) and motor torpedo boats engaged 4 E-Boats 7 miles east of 53 F Buoy driving them north. What was possibly same group reappeared at 0041 16 miles east of 53 F and were again driven north well before they reached convoy route. In both these engagements RIOU successfully vectored M.T.Bs. on to enemy, hits being scored.

1945, respectively.

Biryusov stated that the Bulgarian Govt. had made this request more than once before notably on 21st Nov. 1944 but he had refused to forward it to Moscow as lst Nov. 1944 but he had refused to forward it to Moscow as he did not (not) think the time was ripe. He was however now prepared to forward the request and asked General Crane and myself to do the same. His reasons for now taking a more favourable view were that the Bulgarians had been giving, considerable armed assistance to the Allied cause for six months. They had fought under him (Biryusov)'s command in Jugo-Slavia and were now fighting under Marshal Tolbukhin's Command in Hungary. Their maximum effort in Jugo Slavia had according to him amounted to the equivalent of 20 Divisions and was now six and he personally thought that at any rate the troops who were fighting should be considered as co-belligerents. Further he pointed out that Bulgaria had never sent troops to the Eastern or Western Fronts and in that sense were not on the same foot as Roumania although this did not absolve them from the responsibility for their actions. He then asked General Crane and myself whether we had any remarks. We both replied that this was a matter of policy which we did not feel ourselves in a position to comment upon. I did however point out to him that on 29th Nov. 1944 in accordance with your instructions I maked for his views on the subject of Bulgarian comballigarency asked for his views on the subject of Bulgarian co-belligerency asked for his views on the subject of Bulgarian co-belligerency and that he had replied that there was no question of granting it as far as he knew. - 3. In view of this and similar difficulties, the Chiefs of Staff have recently instituted an enquiry into the engineering manpower situation in all three services on the end of the German war. This may make possible some expansion of the intermediate base as previously envisaged, but it must be realised that, unless and until the Chiefs of Staff increase the allocation of manpower to Naval works Phases I and II of the Base as now planned represent the maximum effort of which our manpower resources allow.
- Para.3. of your 080236z March, materials for Phases I and II are now being shipped. Request you will signal as soon as possible approximate extent to which the various facilities in the projected base as planned here fall short of your requirements. Every effort will be made to make good deficiencies.
- The very considerable amount of inter-departmental work which has proved necessary in drawing up the outline plan of the intermediate base shows clearly that the only practicable modus operandi is for detailed planning to meet your requirements to be done in the Admiralty, where alone is available all the necessary information regarding the supply position, priorities etc. supply position, priorities etc.

0312 again a faint H.E. contact from northerly direction; star shell on this occasion failed to explode and contact was only held for one minute.

I considered that had I proceeded amongst the rocks I should have gone ashore.

0319 heavy gunfire from northwest of Chausey Rocks towards Granville for about 2 minutes.

0330 star shell and exchange of tracer fire observed some distance north of Chausey Rocks. I assumed this to be supporting craft

from Cherbourg. There was no more firing of any kind. I had been calling Granville on R/T since Ol56 for information without success. 0415 shifted to 2068 k/cs and passed my report to Cherbourg: continued patrolling area until daylight without result. extended the patrol as far as the Herpin.

O658 Granville came through on W/T and asked if they should use R/T wave. I replied negative as I was then in communication with H.M.T. PORCHER who was passing me Plymouth's 090559.

remained on 2068 k/cs subsequently. 0833 closed GEM who had come up from Cancale and instructed her to anchor near Videcoq until further orders.

comshafts in most U-Boats have been modified. This combined with the experience gained by crews has enabled U-Boats to Schnorkel in seas up to force 6.

(3) When Schnorkelling in rought weather speed must be increased in order to maintain Schnorkel depth. If Schnorkel smoke is

to coincide with reception of W/T routines referred to in Admiralty Message 881 AZ of 11th Feb.

(6) When fully submerged under favourable conditions the average

range at which Asdic transmissions can be detected on U-Boat hydrophones is 6-8 miles. Surface vessels are, however, normally first detected by their propeller H.E.

(7) A Schnorkelling U-Boat can hear little or no H.E. owing to the noise of her own diesel engines. It is common practice therefore for U-Boats to stop their diesels at regular intervals when on patrol and carry out a short all-round hydrophone search. (8) Type XXI and XXIII U-Boats are fitted with extensible telescopic Schnorkel tubes. It is unlikely that even with this new version of Schnorkel new type U-Boats will be able to gain more than an extra knot owing to strain on the Schnorkel tube and/or

periscope.
(9) An account of Anti-radar coverings of Schnorkel will be found in C.B. 04050/45 (2). U-Boats can at present not detect 10 cm. radar on the G.S.R. aerial fitted on Schnorkel top.

M.T.B. 717 attempted to torpedo the leading ship but missed and M.T.B. 723 fired two torpedoes at the second ship in the line. Evidence not conclusive, but it is possible that one hit was obtained. Conditions for attack were very difficult owing to the blinding Evidence is effect of enemy starshell and concentrated tracer fire. Our force engaged the enemy with 6 pdr. and light automatic weapons. Several hits of all arms were seen on all the enemy ships. After a brisk gum action, our force retired south between Tviberg and Atlee and returned north passing to the westward of Tviberg, hoping to re-engage the enemy. On arriving north of Tviberg, they could see nothing of the convoy.
As our force was retiring between Tviberg and Atlee the enemy ships were appearing to be firing at each other. In the course of the gun action, M.T.B. 717 suffered superficial damage. A/S Weapons. (d) Depth charges dropped by surface craft or

aircraft, during attacks or dummy attacks.

Note: A command policy has been adopted whereby A/S surface

craft and aircraft drop deterrent charges daily at random throughout the command area.

Fired from A/S craft when (c) Hedgehog or Squid salvoes. attacking possible U-Boat contacts.
U-Boats. (f) Ships torpedoed. A U-Boat tprpedoing a ship. Note: U-Boat torpedo attacks are very rarely seen as their

At the time my command is terminated and is divided into its British and U.S. components, each under its own Commander-in-Chief the question will arise of the continued applicability of the administrative and jurisdictional agreements with the several liberated countries and various auxiliary agreements. It is considered important that certain provisions of the agreements such as the right to requisition jurisdiction over troops trial by indigenous courts of offences against the safety and security of British/U.S. Forces, immunity from taxes and customs etc. particularly in those countries through which the British/U.S. supply lines will run and in which British/U.S. Military installations will be located continue in force. It is possible that the liberated countries concerned will object to continuance of the special rights under operational conditions but these will be inoperative by their own terms. Accordingly the simplest method of dealing with the problem appears to be agreement on the continuance in force of the agreements. Therefore I recommend that negotiations be immediately undertaken on behalf of the respective U.S/U.K. Governments through such diplomatic or other representatives as they may select with the appropriate authorities of the various countries with a view to confirming that the British and U.S. Commanders-in-Chief respectively succeed to my authority under the agreements and that all the provisions of the agreements, from the time of termination of Combined Command forward, apply to them respectively and to the forces under their commands. There is another important aspect. Some logistical matters, particularly the allocation of transportation means and fuels will require co-ordination between the requirements of the armed forces and the economic needs of liberated Governments. Machinery for dealing with these problems must be created or be left after S.H.A. E.F. ceases to exist in order to insure administrative support for forces occupying Germany and adequate facilities for re-deploy-In principle it would be desirable if measures for economic relief could be co-ordinated with continued military requirements as to facilitate necessary negotiation on behalf of latter. We are giving further study to machinery which may be necessary for above purposes. Policy guidance would be helpnecessary for above purposes.
