(c) At Kristiansund the 17 U-boats are numbers U.281, 299. 369, 712, 1182, 2321,2325,2334,2335,2337, 2350, 2353, 2354, 2361, 2363, 4706 and 2529, the last of 1600 tons.

(d) At Stavanger the 9 U-boats are numbers U.637 (damaged by M.T.Bs. on April 26th), 901, 1171, 2324, 2329, 2342, 2345, 2348, and 3035. (e) Two, only, survivors of M.G.B.2002, mined and sunk on May 9th, have been picked up off

Japanese 10,000 ton cruiser sunk 8. The cruiser which was sighted by aircraft yesterday was sunk at 1 a.m. today by D.26 in SAUMAREZ with VENUS, VIRAGO, VIGILANT and VERULAM in 5° OO' N. 99° 35'- E. (about 50° W.S.W. of Penang).

The remaining enemy ships were unaccounted for. The SAUMAREZ had one boiler room out of action.

9. During last night 4 M.Ls. destroyed an armed supply craft and killed 80 Japanese in the Irrawaddy delta. One M.L. was damaged and one rating killed.

11. Mariners from Lingayen last night straffed and burned a lugger, left three motor boats dead in water 15 miles N.W. Takao and also left a small coaster dead in water off the Pescadores and straffed small craft off the China coast.

12. Today carrier aircraft from B.P.F. dropped 90 tons of bombs on airfields in the Sakishima Gunto rendering all unserviceable. Four new aircraft straffed on ground, a big explosion was caused in vicinity of Omaha town, oil dump fired and a small coaster and one lugger were left sinking. Two luggers and six barges were rocketted.

New Guinea 13. A sloop and a corvette and 2 M.Ls. of the Australian Navy bombarded shore positions in vicinity of Wewak in support of ground operations.

Submarine 14. American submarines sank a tanker, a medium sized cargo ship, a minelayer and a large trawler today.

3. The rate of expansion visualised by the Admiralty is not known, but it must presumably be conditioned to a large extent by the availability of airfields and consequently by the rate of provision of MONABS to man them, assuming we can get the fields as fast as we can take them over.

It is assumed that MONABS can be formed in the U.K. shipped at the rate of one permonth. MONAB 8 is due in August. Six more would be required and the fully expended force would then have the bare minimum of airfield accommodation by March 1946.

5. There remains the requirement to obtain the seven additional airfields in Australia. 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

(2) Ships.
(a) Nazi flag is not repeat not on any account to be permitted to be worn. White Ensign only is to be hoisted on board ships lying in British ports.

(b) Any ships temporarily employed for Allied purposes with German crews, e.g. minesweepers, are to wear international code flag "C" with triangle cut from the end. This flag has been adopted by S.H.A.E.F. as a symbol of Allied control of vessels employed with German crews. When British naval officers are on board such vessels, White Ensign should in addition be hoisted superior to control flag. (3) Status of Personnel.

Status of surrendered naval personnel detained ashore or on board German warships is not precisely defined. Pending further instructions they are not being declared Prisoners of War for reasons connected with the application of the Geneva Convention. For practical purposes, however, they should be dealt with on the same basis as Prisoners of War, but may be employed on care and maintenance duties to the extent required. (4) Non-Fraternisation.

A policy of strict non-fraternisation is to be enjoined on all ranks coming in contact with surrendered naval personnel. This means that -

(a) friendliness or familiarity is not permitted and an attitude of stern courtesy adopted. The attitude of Allied personnel is to be just but firm, making it clear that immediate compliance with orders and instructions will be enforced.
(b) Contact with Germans is to be restricted to the minimum necessary to ensure execution of orders and the satisfaction of Allied requirements. There is to be no repeat no entertaining of Germans, whether official or otherwise.

(c) Salutes and military honours should not repeat not be accorded to German officers. German Commanders are not repeat not to fly their flags and German naval officers are not to be piped on board any Allied warship.

(d) Salutes by Germans are obligatory when carrying out duties with Allied officers, and salutes given by Germans are to be returned.



Re U-boats at Bergen, Norway.

Reference C.O.S.(W) 877. Following report has been received by C. in C. Home Fleet from C.S.I. after visit to Bergen. Begins: I am rather concerned about the stability of the

situation at Bergen depending as it does on the continued discipline and good sense of the German armed forces, the Norwegians and the Russians ex Prisoners of War. Any small incident combined with the deterioration of discipline, which seems bound to occur before long, may well lead to a clash which would be serious as the Germans still have some arms and outnumber the rest. There is the further important point that the Germans, and particularly the German Navy, are occupying shipyards, buildings and houses in and around Bergen which are needed by the Norwegians before conditions can start to return to normal.

As a start I consider it most desirable that the 32 sea-worthy U-boats should be sent away from Bergen as soon as possible as they and their crews are so much in evidence in the town. In addition, even if it is not yet possible to carry out a large scale evacuation of the remaining German Naval personnel, at least a token few should be evacuated to Germany now so as to show both Germans and Norwegians that the situation is not stagnant. This also applies to the German Army, though except for headquarters personnel, the majority have already been concentrated away from Bergen. Ends.

This fully substantiates our argument that U-boats in Norwegian waters should be moved to U.K. You should at once inform Cominch and emphasise the need for a very early decision on C.O.S.(W) 877. (P.A.S.(L) App. V.C.N.S., 230001B to B.A.D. Washington).

Communications orders for British Armed Merchant ships. The following does not apply to transports carrying 250 troops or more which shall comply with all war-time communication instructions heretofore effective. While ships are in noncombat areas radio communications from ship to shore and shore to ship are permitted under the following conditions.

(a) All radio communications between ship and shore or vice versa shall be routed through naval operated or controlled channels. All

coastal stations now or hereafter listed in W.I.M.S.3, Appendix A and also all U.S. commercial coastal and marine relay stations are considered to be naval controlled.

(b) Messages may be in plain language using international call signs except that no message will be sent in plain language which may disclose to the enemy information of impending movements into combat areas. For this purpose Aden, Capetown and Balboa shall be considered as coming within the combat area.

(c) No private messages, that is messages other than those concerning essential ship business are permitted. Ships shall continue to guard B.A.M.S. schedules from zone and area stations.

Special single and two operator watchkeeping periods contained Appendix B W.I.M.S.3 remain in force for all ships except those operating exclusively in U.K. or Continental European coastal trade which shall revert to international periods. Coastal radio stations will revert to direct method of communicating with merchant ships. See article 10 W.I.M.S.3. Effective 1001Z/29th May.

Para. 4. In my opinion we have now an excellent opportunity to ask the Russians for some reciprocal action on their part. In return for according them facilities to visit O.K.M. and O.K.L. which is established near Berchtesgaden, I would propose to ask them for authority to send parties to Berlin to examine military intelligence targets there and also to raise again the long standing questions of a Naval visit to Gydnia and of air photography of Berlin which they have stalled over during the past few weeks.

The latest information regarding:

(1) The relief in the B.P.F. of men to be released to civil life and

(2) The B.P.F. home service roster for men who will continue to serve but who are near to completing their period of service abroad is as follows.

2. Class A releases. Reliefs to effect these are going ahead and from all available records the following is the position today:

- (A) Groups 1 4 all have been relieved except three higher ratings and are on their way home.
- (B) Groups 5 6 contain 61 men. Reliefs except for two have arrived in Australia and the majority are being sent to ships as soon as possible.
- (C) Group 7 contains 68 men. Reliefs for the majority are on way by sea and will arrive in Australia mid June.
- (D) Group 8 contains 37 men. Some can be relieved mid Junc. All reliefs have been asked for.
- (E) Groups 9 12 contain 135. A certain number will be relieved shortly and the majority will have been relieved by October.
- (F) Groups 13 20. So far as is known these groups will continue to be relieved at regular intervals as is done for earlier groups.

3. Class E releases. These will be made by nomination of individuals from sources in the U.K. No information is yet available.

4. Officers. There are 30 officers in groups 1 - 4 and 120 in groups 5 - 12. None have yet been relieved but warning signals about some officers in group one have been received. It is hoped that a number of officers in groups 1 - 7 will be relieved on the station before the end of the year.

5. Passage home. Men relieved are sent home by special transports at monthly intervals. The passage takes $i_{\rm H} = 6$ weeks.

6. Instructions about releases, A.F.O.s on insurance, issue of plain clothes, pay during leave after release, continuation of allotments, gratuities etc. have been issued and will shortly be received by the Fleet.

7. Home service rester. Ratings who are not due for discharge to the shore are placed on the home service roster on completion of two years.service abroad and it has so far been possible to relieve the majority at two years and three months.

8. C. in C.'s remarks. Whilst endeavouring to carry out the plans laid down by the Government individual cases of delay must occur since I have to consider the merits of urgent compassionate relief, sickness, shortage of certain key ratings and the fighting efficiency of the Fleet.

9. I give my personal attention to all these questions and the Admiralty is doing its best to assist.





D. It would be a condition of the transfer that the New Zealand squadrons should be employed as integral units. E. This would be a matter for later decision, but it is thought that it would be preferable for personnel to remain part of the R.N.Z.N.F.

(C. in C. B.P.F., 310856Z to Admty). Your 260844. My principle reason for suggesting use of New Zealand Corsair Squad is that the shortage of air personnel has been a limiting factor in the scale of operations that we can carry out in this theatre, and consequently the inclusion of these trained New Zealand personnel would -

 (A) initially help to build up a reserve carrier group.
 (B) subsequently acting as an addition to the replacement squads already planned.

Considerable use can also be made of their equipment and 2. A/C even if further flow of replacement Corsair A/C were to be cut off from America.

3. I also consider that this would be a good opportunity for New Zealand to make a start in forming a F.A.A. (as is now being considered in Australia).
