HELLO MUSCAT!

After a few testing months and a challenging Straits of Hormuz transit, Chiddingfold and Penzance's lucky lads and lasses were rewarded for their hard work with a week of adventurous training in Muscat, the capital of Oman. Highlights included tours of the famous Wadi Shab, a fresh water-filled valley full of high diving areas, and opportunities to Kayaking and Paddleboarding. Over 80 personnel across the two ships managed to get at least one day experience, all paid for by the Navy.

Other such activities that were available and subsidized by the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity included a fishing trip out into the waters surrounding Muscat, where they were given a whole afternoon of deep sea fishing with expert fisherman in the areas off Muscat. An abundance of wildlife was seen in the habitats around there, including Omani turtles, Dolphins, Dorado, as well as Tuna.

A highlight of the week for all that attended was a hike through the Wadi Shab – a kilometer long gorge with a fresh water stream running through the middle. It provided the perfect mix of scrambling over rocks and cooling off in deep water rock pools, all set against the breathing taking backdrop of the Omani desert.
